





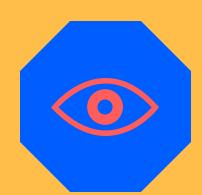


TO DRIVE OR NOT TO DRIVE?

Driving is a life-skill that allows a person to be self-reliant, independent and mobile. Unfortunately, people who have Parkinson's Disease / Tremor-related conditions often experience a number of involuntary movements and changes to their bodily function, which may interfere with driving and compromise on safety.

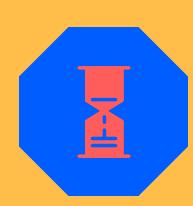


Here are some questions to consider when determining whether or not to drive:



VISION

- Do you distinguish colours well? e.g. change in traffic lights
- Are you able to see well in the nighttime?
- Can you blink normally? i.e. no erratic blinking



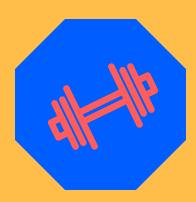
REFLEXES & REACTION TIME

- Are your reflexes still intact?
- Can you still react quickly to sudden changes on the road?



MULTI-TASKING

 Are you able to handle more than onetask at the same time? e.g. driving and planning your route ahead, listening to the GPS as it dictates directions. switching gears, etc.



STRENGTH

- Can you turn the steering wheel without much effort?
- Can you press on the brake and clutch pedals with enough strength?



MEDICATION

• If you take medication, are you certain that they do not cause drowsiness, fatigue, blurry vision or confusion?



SELF-CONFIDENCE

- Do you feel strongly that you will not endanger the lives of others?
- Are you confident that no one around you has commented negatively about your driving?
